Key Learning Question: How does Turkey compare to the UK?



Crucial Knowledge

- The United Kingdom is made up of England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland.
- The capital cities are London, Edinburgh, Belfast, Cardiff.
- The UK has a range of physical geography features, including mountains, forests and coastal areas
- Turkey is around 2000 miles from London.
- It is split between the continents of Europe and Asia.
- Istanbul is split between Europe and Asia.
- It is the most populated city in Europe with over 15 million people.
- Turkey has a range of spectacular physical features which are very different from London.
- Turkey is closer to the equator than the UK so has warmer temperatures.



Key Vocabulary

Asia: a continent east of Europe.

Europe: a continent that is north of Africa and west of Asia.

United Kingdom: The place where we live, made up of 4 separate countries.

City: a place where many thousands of people live and work

Human feature: A geographical feature made or shaped by people.

Physical feature: A geographical feature that is natural and not made by people.

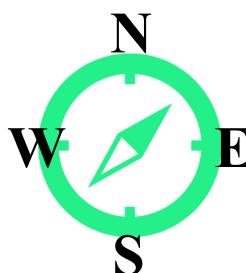
Lagoon: A stretch of saltwater that is separated from the sea

Mountain range: A series of mountains arranged connected in a line

Equator: An imaginary line around the earth, halfway between the north and south pole

- 80 million people
- Borders Greece, Syria, Georgia, Armenia, Iraq, Iran, Bulgaria.

- 15 million people
- Largest city in Europe
- Founded on 7 hills



The Bosphorus:

- Connects Black Sea and Sea of Marmara
- 31km long
- 700m narrowest point
